Ontario Awarding Victim Support Grant to Nottawasaga OPP

Province supporting victims and survivors of intimate partner violence/domestic violence, human trafficking and child exploitation



ALLISTON, ON – The Ontario government is investing more than \$4 million across the province to help support victims and survivors of intimate partner violence/domestic violence, human trafficking, and child exploitation. The funding is being delivered through the Victim Support Grant program and includes \$85,420.35 for the Nottawasaga detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.





surrounding OPP detachments support victims of human trafficking and intimate partner violence.

Project Safe Paths has two dedicated police crisis beds at Imani's Place to facilitate referrals, provide protection and assist in rehabilitating victims of trafficking and intimate partner violence in a culturally affirming environment. The project will also fund B.R.I.G.H.T. (Bringing Real Internet Guidance to Help Teens) presentations at schools and in the community.



"Today's announcement will ensure that the Nottawasaga detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, along with their dedicated community partners will be able to continue the critical work they do to support victims and survivors of human trafficking, exploitation and intimate partner

"Support for victims and survivors is a crucial first step to recovery," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "This important grant is part of our government's plan to combat violent crime on our streets and ensure that victims are not left behind."

The Victim Support Grant (VSG) is part of Ontario's Guns, Gangs and Violence Reduction Strategy and complements the province's \$307 million Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy, 2020- 2025 and Combating Human Trafficking Act, 2021.





All municipal and First Nation police services as well as the Ontario Provincial Police are eligible to apply for funding through the VSG program.

- The VSG can be used for a variety of projects and initiatives, including specialized training for law enforcement, culturally responsive education and awareness campaigns, and purchasing technology and equipment to enhance police investigations and provide survivors with the option to complete interviews remotely.
- Of the 45 projects being funded across the province, 19 will focus on intimate partner violence and domestic violence, five on human trafficking, three on child exploitation, and 18 that will focus on all three areas.
- The Ontario government is investing over \$2 million in the Partner Assault Response (PAR) program to help break the cycle of intimate partner violence and keep communities safe. The PAR program provides specialized group education and counselling for people charged with intimate partner violence offences and offers support to current partners of those in the program. This two-year investment is in addition to themore than \$2 million given to PAR providers in 2022.

At the City of Hamilton Council meeting of September 13, the following motion was approved:

7.2 Municipal Resolution in Support of Basic Income for the City of Hamilton

WHEREAS, The City of Hamilton recognizes the social and economic challenges faced by its residents that have a detrimental impact on the determinants of health including income inequality, poverty, inadequate housing and precarious employment;

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the City of Hamilton to strive for the well-being and prosperity of all its residents, which includes ensuring access to basic needs and opportunities to improve health;

WHEREAS, through addressing poverty and improving access to healthcare, a Guaranteed Livable Basic Income can potentially reduce healthcare costs enabling people to afford preventive care and timely treatments while preventing more costly healthcare interventions, leading to better overall population health,

WHEREAS, a Basic Income program was tested in Hamilton during the Ontario Basic Income Pilot project between 2017 and 2019 and more than 1,000 local residents reported positive outcomes including the alleviation of food and housing insecurity, improved physical and mental health, financial stability, social equity and greater connection to the labour market;



WHEREAS, the Federal Budget Office upon reviewing the concept of a national Guaranteed Basic Income program determined it could, if properly set out, be a major economic driver to the Canadian economy; and

WHEREAS, a Basic Income program can complement and enhance existing social support systems, ensuring a comprehensive and inclusive approach to addressing the needs of Hamilton residents including persons with disabilities and aligns and complements the City of Hamilton's Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That the City of Hamilton supports the concept of a Guaranteed Livable Basic Income to combat poverty, income inequality, and economic insecurity within our community; and supports the continuing advocacy of the Basic Income Hamilton Working Group (under the auspices of the Hamilton Roundtable for Poverty Reduction) to share research and the unique experiences of local residents who participated in the Ontario Basic Income Pilot project;
- (b) That the City of Hamilton calls upon the provincial and federal governments to collaborate to implement a national Guaranteed Livable Basic Income program;
- (c) That Hamilton City Council directs the Office of the Mayor to write a letter to the Prime Minister, local Members of Parliament and the Senate, the Premier of Ontario, local Members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, calling on these orders of government to work collaboratively towards implementing a National Guaranteed Livable Basic Income to eradicate poverty and homelessness, and ensure everyone has sufficient income to meet their basic needs; and
- (d) That the City of Hamilton encourages other municipalities across the province and the country to join in advocating for a Guaranteed Livable Basic Income as a key policy tool in the fight against poverty and inequality and to this end, Hamilton City Council will advocate through its representatives at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and the Canadian Federation of Municipalities for Guaranteed Livable Basic Income resolutions at meetings of those organizations.







RE: Illegal Car Rally - Provincial Task Force

Please be advised that the Council of the Town of Wasaga Beach, during their September 14, 2023 Council meeting adopted the following resolution regarding illegal car rallies:

WHEREAS the prevalence of unsanctioned car rally events has grown in recent years throughout North America:

AND WHEREAS the Town of Wasaga Beach has been the target of unsanctioned car rallies over the past four years resulting in property damage, threats to public order, and significant risk to people's safety and enjoyment of their property;

AND WHEREAS the protections afforded by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms are being violated by unsanctioned car rally organizers and participants, thereby infringing on the rights of others and undermined the response of enforcement personnel;

AND WHEREAS unsanctioned car rally activity crosses multiple jurisdictions requiring a province wide coordinated response framework to protect all communities from the same disruption and risk to public safety;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Town of Wasaga Beach requests that a provincial task force be assembled to create a municipal response framework to protect communities from unsanctioned car rallies with a mandate to include, but not limited to:

- Investigate legislative enhancements and tools to assist municipalities in responding and enforcing unsanctioned car rallies.
- Investigate expanded powers for municipal law enforcement officers.
- Develop a proactive approach to awareness, prevention, enforcement and collaboration across all enforcement personnel, including police, municipal law enforcement officers and other provincial offences officers.
- Investigate harsher penalties and increased fines for unsanctioned car rally organizers and participants.



AND FURTHER THAT the Province provide funding to municipalities to assist with the cost in enforcing unsanctioned car rallies;

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Right Honourable Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Honourable Michael Kerzner, Solicitor General of Ontario, the Honourable Doug Downey, Attorney General of Ontario, the Honourable Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Honourable Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation, MPP Brian Saunderson, Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police, County of Simcoe, FCM, and AMO;

SUBJECT: Provincial legislation for third-party short-term rental companies

Please be advised that at its meeting held Tuesday, September 26, 2023, the Council of the City of Burlington approved the following resolution:

Whereas the demand for alternative accommodations has resulted in an increased prominence of residential properties being advertised for short term accommodations through third party companies such as Airbnb and VRBO; a shift from the 'traditional' cottage rental historically managed by a property owner; and

Whereas over the past decade a flood of properties have been removed from the ownership and long-term rental market (Canada Research Chair in Urban Governance at McGill University) contributing to housing shortages, increased housing demands and increased housing costs resulting in housing affordability issues, including affordable rentals; and

Whereas short term rentals (STR) can be beneficial, when operated appropriately, by providing solutions for the accommodation industry that supports local tourism and small businesses as well as providing an opportunity for property owners to generate income from their residence (permanent or seasonal) using a convenient third-party system; and

Whereas STR's can create nuisances including noise, parking, high volumes of visitors attending a property, septic capacity and fire safety, for adjacent residential property owners who wish to experience quiet enjoyment of their property; and

Whereas research indicates that demand for STR's is increasing, in part due to vacationers choosing domestic travel options as well as the financial benefits to property owners, demonstrating that STR's are here to stay; and

Whereas there are no Provincial regulations in place governing third party STR companies resulting in a variety of regulations/guidelines being implemented at the local municipal level which creates inconsistencies, confusion and frustrations for both consumers and residents across the province; and



Therefore, be it resolved that Burlington City Council calls on the Provincial Government to move forward as soon as possible to legislate all third-party short-term rental brokerage companies, for example Airbnb and VRBO, requiring them to:

- appropriately manage and be responsible for their listings, and to compel compliance; and
- establish a registry system, making it mandatory for each rental listing to
 register and pay an appropriate annual fee, with the requirement that STR
 companies are to provide the registry and collected fees to the municipality in
 which the STR properties are located, allowing municipalities to be aware of
 all registered STR properties and to have access to funds to assist with the
 response and enforcement of issues surrounding STR properties; and
- de-list/remove a property from the STR company's listing when a municipality
 has identified and verified life, health and/or nuisance infractions including
 noise, fire safety, septic, etc.to ensure a property cannot be rented; and

That a copy of this resolution be sent to all Ontario municipalities for support as well as to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing and Halton MPPs.

Re: Childcare availability in Ontario

Dear Minister Thompson:

The Municipality of Bluewater is concerned about the critical issue of childcare availability in our province and how it is linked to educational requirements and low wages within the childcare sector. We believe that addressing these issues is crucial for the well-being of our families and the future prosperity of Bluewater and Ontario.

Childcare availability in Ontario has become an increasingly pressing problem for parents and guardians. Access to affordable, high-quality childcare is essential for families to balance work and family responsibilities, and it plays a vital role in supporting the early development and education of our children. However, the lack of available childcare spaces is a significant barrier for many parents, limiting their ability to participate fully in the workforce and achieve financial stability.

We suspect that one of the key factors contributing to the shortage of childcare spaces is the educational requirements imposed on childcare workers. This low-wage structure not only makes it difficult to attract and retain skilled childcare educators but also effects the quality of care children receive. Investing in the professional development and fair compensation of early childcare educators is essential to ensure that our children receive the best care possible and the best start in life.

To address these issues and improve childcare availability in Ontario, the Municipality urges you to consider the following actions:

- 1. Review and Reform Educational Requirements: Work with relevant stakeholders to review and potentially revise the training methods of early childcare educators, striking a balance between safety and accessibility by increasing the praxis model to learning.
- 2. Invest in Professional Development: Advocate for increased investment in professional development opportunities for childcare workers to enhance their skills and qualifications.
- 3. Increase Wages: Support initiatives to increase the wages of childcare workers, ensuring that they are paid a fair and competitive salary for the vital work they do.
- 4. Expand Funding: Work to secure additional funding for the expansion of childcare services and facilities, especially in underserved and rural communities.
- 5. Promote Public Awareness: Raise public awareness about the importance of accessible and high-quality childcare services and the need for policy changes.

This is an urgent matter that is expected to worsen and your timely response to these concerns is needed.

By addressing these issues, we can make significant strides toward improving childcare availability in Bluewater and Ontario and ensuring that families have the support they need to thrive. We kindly request your timely support and advocacy on these matters and would be grateful for any updates or initiatives related to childcare reform in our province.

Plant trees with NVCA next spring

UTOPIA, Ontario (October 3, 2023) – The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) is searching for landowners looking to plant trees in the spring of 2024. Each year, NVCA's forestry program plants around 100,000 trees for property owners in the Nottawasaga Watershed who want to convert their land into forests.

Planting trees helps to provide wildlife habitat, shade rivers and streams, produces oxygen, among many other benefits. Well managed forests also contribute to the economy by providing wood for construction and wood fiber for products such as paper.

"In the early 1900s, as settlers established communities in the Nottawasaga Watershed, they started to clear land for farming, but the topsoil quickly eroded and sand underneath was exposed," said Rick Grillmayer, Manager of Forestry at NVCA. "Between the 1960s and early 1990s, the Province of Ontario planted millions of trees to restore our forests. Fast forward to today, NVCA is the only organization in the watershed that offers professional tree planting services."

NVCA has a minimum requirement of 1 hectare or approximately 2 acres of planting space. All properties must be located in the Nottawasaga Watershed, landowners can use NVCA's Interactive Data Viewer to determine where their property is located.

Thanks to funding support from Forest Ontario's 50 Million Trees Program, the Simcoe County Tree Planting Program, and the Town of New Tecumseth Tree Planting Program, landowners may be eligible for grants for tree planting. Grant availability depends on property size and location and range between 60-88% of tree planting costs for 2024.

Properties over 4.45 hectares or 11 acres in size may be eligible for the Managed Forest Tax Incentive Program.

Re: Provincial Partnership to Build More Homes, Support Healthcare and Economic Development in Simcoe County

Dear Minister Calandra,

On behalf of the Town of Collingwood and the Town of New Tecumseth, we congratulate you on your appointment as the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. We look forward to collaborating with you and your government on achieving your goal of building 1.5 million new homes by 2031.

Currently, Collingwood and New Tecumseth are working on a large infrastructure project which will enable the construction of tens of thousands of new homes. Today, the residents of New Tecumseth receive water from a 60 km pipeline which the Provincial government helped to fund, which draws water from Georgian Bay in Collingwood. After decades of service, this shared treatment and distribution system needs increased capacity to allow both municipalities to contribute to assisting the Province with meeting the provincial goal. .

Collingwood and New Tecumseth have proposed expanding the water treatment facilities in Collingwood to enable additional capacity for almost 24,000 new homes or the equivalent in commercial or industrial uses, with an additional almost 36,000 new homes capacity enabled in easily implemented stepped increases. Unfortunately, the cost of this project grew from \$50 million eight years ago, to \$120 million in 2022, to \$270 million in 2023 when the bids for the project were received. These bids are only valid for 60 days until November 10th and are likely to only increase after they expire.

Both Collingwood and New Tecumseth lack the debt capacity and fiscal ability to cover the increase in costs to the project. Both our communities are growing quickly, and have the potential to greatly



contribute to Ontario's housing and economic growth, but only if the new water treatment plant is constructed.

The Town of Collingwood and Town of New Tecumseth seek the Government of Ontario's support in filling the funding gap for the new Water Treatment plant. This project will enable up to 24,000 new homes in Phase 1, and up to 36,000 new units in Phase 2. If the project does not proceed, only 2,000 new homes could be built with the plant's current remaining water capacity. Additional interim supply can be enabled should the expansion proceed.

In addition to building new homes, our communities also need increased water treatment capacity to support the development of a new Collingwood regional hospital and potential economic development opportunities including in the automotive sector that New Tecumseth is currently working on collaboratively with the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade. Essential projects could be jeopardized if we are not able address the water capacity issue in our communities.

Our municipalities are ready to leverage every tool at our disposal to ensure the underlying infrastructure exists to support our local development. However, we need to partner with the provincial government to make it happen. The partnership could include multiple dimensions such as potential grants, creative financing, removing provincial barriers to municipal debt capacity, etc.

We are requesting that you to assign the Provincial Land Development Facilitator, Paula Dill, to engage our municipal staff and co-develop a solution that they can bring to provincial and municipal decision makers. Unfortunately, time is limited. A solution must be found within the month of October or we risk having to retender the project which will undoubted result in a higher cost to address the necessary water capacity to build homes, support the proposed hospital and unlock economic development opportunities for our communities.

Policy Update - Affordable Homes and Good Jobs Act Introduced and Housing Affordability Task Force Recommendations Response

Affordable Homes, Good Jobs Act Introduced

On September 28, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing introduced new legislation that, if enacted, would incorporate an income component into the definition of affordable housing for the purposes of exemptions from development charges. Consistent with the approach advocated by AMO, the definition is based on the standard of housing costing no more than 30 percent of household income. Precise details are still required as part of the Minister's Affordable Housing Bulletin to enable implementation. AMO will continue to highlight for the government the importance of issuing this bulletin as soon as possible to enable municipalities to understand implications for budgets.

The bill, if enacted, would also support St. Thomas to provide municipal incentives as part of the building of an electric vehicle battery manufacturing plant; would streamline Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) decisions through regulatory change; and provide municipalities with the option of accessing Vendors of Records under Supply Chain Ontario. AMO plans to work with its Land Use Planning and Resources Task Force to make a submission to the government as part of the OLT regulatory consultation.

Housing Affordability Task Force Recommendations Response

At its meeting on September 29th, the AMO Board considered the recent request made by Minister Calandra to mayors across Ontario regarding their views on the recommendations of the Housing Affordability Task Force. The Minister has requested that all heads of council respond to the request by **October 16th** or risk financial penalties for their municipality. AMO had previously requested that the ministry extend the deadline to allow mayors to consult with councils, however the request was not granted. AMO urges all members who received a letter from the Minister –





including those without provincial housing targets – to meet this deadline to remain eligible for investments under the Building Faster Fund.

To support members as consider their response, the AMO Board has <u>sent a letter to Minister Calandra</u> and stated that the letter would be shared with all municipal governments. While mayors will each make individual decisions that reflect local circumstances, AMO states that at a sector-level, **municipalities conditionally support all Task Force recommendations** with a few exceptions, provided that the government puts in place:

- A fair and sustainable funding framework to support infrastructure and growth, that is not unduly subsidized by existing property taxpayers;
- 2. A comprehensive, sequenced implementation plan that gives both developers and municipalities certainty regarding costs and rules to support effective long-term decision-making;
- 3. An **accountability framework** that accurately recognizes the roles and responsibilities of different housing partners and does not hold municipalities accountable for the actions of developers or provincial ministries. Mechanisms must be included to ensure that public investments are tied to outcomes in the public interest;
- 4. A core focus on **non-market housing**, which was not within the mandate of the Housing Affordability Task Force. A robust non-market housing sector is a critical part of a well-functioning overall housing system and needs to be prioritized by governments.
- 5. A public policy review by the Ontario Public Service verifying that each recommendation is feasible, likely to result in increased housing supply and/or affordability and is in the public interest.

The letter identifies top recommendations from the Task Force for prioritization, as well as three recommendations that AMO objects to on principle.

AMO has previously stated that the government has chosen its own path in addressing the housing crisis in Ontario, despite the advice of municipalities, and will be accountable for its outcomes. AMO has also stated that municipalities will do everything within their power to help the province to achieve its housing targets and outcomes. The AMO Board believes that the response outlined in the letter is reflective of this approach.

2023/24 Ontario Renal Network Operating Funding Agreement for Trillium Manor



Trillium Manor supports the delivery of peritoneal dialysis services to residents within Trillium Manor who require them. The program is managed and funded through Ontario Health.


Both Simcoe Manor and Trillium Manor have had agreements in place to provide peritoneal dialysis to residents for several years. This service is provided in partnership with Orillia Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, the Ontario Renal Network, Cancer Care Ontario, and Ontario Health.

On September 12, 2023, Council received a report on the funding agreement, which will allow Trillium Manor residents to receive hemodialysis treatment within their home rather than at the regional dialysis centre resulting in less disruption in their daily lives and transportation costs.

Transportation Master Plan Update - Project Progress

On September 12, 2023, Council received a report on the Transportation Master Plan (TMP) Update project that is currently in progress, along with an overview of the progress that has been made.

The work plan for the Transportation Master Plan (TMP) Update has been developed into a four-phase plan, with public and stakeholder consultation and communication activities conducted throughout.

Phase II and Phase III Reports were published on the County's TMP webpage on June 22, 2023, providing the opportunity for key stakeholders to submit their comments.

At present, the project team is actively engaged in the process of determining how best to address the comments that have been received. Council will receive a review of the recommendations in the near future.





Blue Box Transition and Collection Week Change

On September 12, 2023, Council received a report on the provincial Blue Box Transition and the associated collection week change.

Part of the provincial Resource Recovery and Circular Economy Act requires that the producers of blue box material set up their own collection system by January 1, 2026, with a transition period from July 1, 2023, through to December 31, 2025. The County of Simcoe was provided a transition date of January 1, 2024.

In negotiation with Circular Materials Ontario (CMO)-the Producer Responsibility Organization (PRO) acting on behalf of producers to set up the collection system-the County has agreed to continue to provide the recycling services on their behalf from January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2025. For this period there will be no change to the method of collection or the types of materials being collected.

As of January 1, 2026, there is still a possibility, though unlikely, that the County may continue to be responsible for curbside recycling collection. It is more likely that CMO will contract separately for these services and the





County of Simcoe will no longer be responsible for collecting recycling material from residences.

Collection Week Change

As of January 1, 2024, the County of Simcoe will no longer be required to transfer recycling collected curbside. CMO has contracted their own transfer facility located in the City of Barrie to transfer this material. This means that the County's collection trucks will be required to empty recycling at the location designated by CMO and then proceed to the County's transfer station to empty organics.

To accommodate these changes, our bi-weekly cart collection rotation will change for some areas of the County. Impacted households will have two consecutive recycling collection weeks (November 27-30 and December 4-7). These households are permitted one additional garbage bag (to be placed beside their cart) on their next garbage week (December 11-14). More information will be made available at simcoe.ca/collectionschange, and a targeted communications and marketing campaign will provide advanced notice to impacted households.

2024 High Level Draft Budget Assumptions

As outlined during the 2023 Budget presentation, the County's operating balance has reduced significantly over the last few years due to efforts to provide modest tax rate increases. This has increased the gap between funding and cost inflation. In addition, cost increases are significant in many areas such as construction, supplies, insurance and other external factors which adds to the need for additional funding to meet growing service and capital project demands. To enable staff to present a responsible, prudent, but forward thinking budget to Council for their review, staff requested that they be permitted to present a draft budget with a Tax Levy increase in the range of 2% for asset management and 3% for operating expenses for a combined increase of approximately 5% for





2024 for Council's review. This is after some significant efforts to reduce impacts. A number of other municipalities in Ontario have communicated similar needs and pressures in developing their 2024 budget request.

On September 26, 2023, following Council deliberations, Council approved the budget assumptions, which directs staff to incorporate the proposed rates into the 2024 County of Simcoe draft budget. The budget review process will begin with Council receiving the proposed draft budget during a special budget meeting and then will have opportunities to review and recommend changes if desired. Budget approvals will follow these discussions in late 2023.

Midhurst/September 27, 2023 – The County of Simcoe, Regional Tourism Organization 7, and the Tourism Innovation Lab are celebrating World Tourism Day on September 27 with the relaunch of a mentorships and grants program designed to "spark" and support entrepreneurs and organizations with innovative tourism ideas for Simcoe County.

The "Spark" Program was first launched in 2018 by the Tourism Innovation Lab and has now been delivered in over 40 regions across Ontario and British Columbia. Its goal is to find, foster and support new tourism ideas that will enhance current offerings, address gaps or challenges, motivate travel and longer stays, increase year-round visits.

In 2022, three selected applicants were matched with a mentor and provided \$3,000 in seed funds to help them get started with their new tourism ideas. Previous Simcoe County recipients successfully pitched poetry concerts, art experiences, and year-round nature retreats and adventures.

For this second "Spark" Program application intake, organizers are especially interested in tourism ideas that will incorporate, address and advance sustainability, waterways and Indigenous tourism in Simcoe County. Individual entrepreneurs, small businesses, non-profits and community groups are encouraged to apply with their new tourism ideas for Simcoe County by October 26, 2023. Following a juried review process, five finalists will be invited to virtual Pitch Session where three winners will be selected to receive mentorships and grants.

County of Simcoe and City of Orillia creating conditions for attainable housing across the region

Midhurst/September 28, 2023 – The County of Simcoe and the City of Orillia are partnering to build up our communities through a new Housing Attainable Supply Action Plan (Housing ASAP). This plan will support residents in the "missing middle" who are looking for housing at a reasonable price in the communities that they love.

The Housing ASAP project will help the governments create the conditions needed for more attainable housing offered by the private market in communities throughout the region. It aims to identify and develop strategies and tactics for the regional and local governments to implement or advocate for over the next five years.

This project will answer three fundamental questions related to attainable housing within Simcoe County and the City of Orillia:

- 1. What is Attainable? In each sub-region of the County, what is the target sale price and target rent that is within reach of the working individual and family?
- 2. What is Missing? What are the number and types of dwellings that need to be integrated into each sub-region for the private sector to deliver market-based housing that is attainable?
- 3. How can we Help? What can municipalities do to help facilitate the attainable units that are needed?

The project has been divided into four components:

- Component 1 Gap Analysis, Background Review
- Component 2 Public and Stakeholder Engagement
- Component 3 Best Practices & Potential Solutions Review
- Component 4 Recommended Action

Information, including a Housing Needs Assessment, will be provided to Councils in Orillia and the County in the coming weeks. Details can be found in the City of Orillia's Council Information
Package and on the Council Information
Package and on the County of Simcoe's Affordable Housing Advisory Committee agendas. The next step of the project will be to garner public and stakeholder input later this fall.

THE HOUSING CONTINUUM







The housing continuum represents the spectrum of housing types available from very low to above moderate-income households. Housing ASAP focuses on the areas from "Affordable Rental Housing" to "Market Home Ownership" portion of the Housing Continuum.

Attainable Housing is sometimes referred to as the "missing middle". Attainable Housing is only a segment along the Housing Continuum. Attainable Housing is providing affordable rental and homeownership opportunities offered by the private market, as opposed to social housing, subsidized housing, transitional housing, emergency shelters, etc.



County presents homelessness winter response plan

Midhurst/October 10, 2023 – Earlier today, County Council was presented with the proposed homelessness services' winter response plan for 2023-2024. As part of the County's 10-point homelessness prevention strategy, this winter response plan highlights proposed actions to support our unhoused population throughout the coldest months of the year.

"We recognize the need for additional supports throughout the winter months to ensure that no one is left out in the cold who is seeking a space indoors," said General Manager Mina Fayez-Bahgat. "County Council continues its significant commitment and support to our social and community services actions, ideas and strategies. As needs increase in our region, Council and staff are taking a proactive approach to build up the lives of those who need our support the most."

The winter response plan outlines the County's enhanced support with:

- · winter warming centres opening 7 days per week during the winter months
- additional mobile response outreach teams supporting additional warming and transportation to shelters during inclement weather
- activation for alternate spaces and temporary overflow beds in shelters, with up to an additional 107 available spaces, over and above the 224 shelter beds already in the system
- new tools to assist the public, service providers, and municipalities in accessing live tothe-minute data on each local homeless shelter's current bed capacity

The real-time data available through the new homelessness dashboard will allow the public and stakeholders to see exactly where and when spaces are available and allow the County and its partners to plan ahead and monitor effectiveness of the long-term strategy. The development of this dashboard will continue to help the County make the best decisions and implement its 10-point homelessness strategy.
