Ontario Digital Public Library proposal from the Federation of Ontario Public Libraries

Presently, individual library systems purchase access to digital content independently according to their available budgets. Some smaller library systems are at a disadvantage due to a smaller taxpayer base. To provide equitable access to information for all Ontarians, regardless of geographic location, an Ontario Digital Public Library is proposed. In this model, Digital Resources would be acquired at a provincial level and made available to all Ontarians.

A provincial purchase would represent the ultimate in "consortium" pricing and result in savings for library systems across the province and bridge the "Digital Divide" to make equitable resources available.

### Ontario Investing \$1 Billion to Help Municipalities Build More Homes

New loan program will help expand drinking water, wastewater and stormwater capacity

November 28, 2024

Infrastructure

TORONTO — The Ontario government is investing up to \$1 billion in loans to provide municipalities with more financing options for water infrastructure projects that enable the construction of more homes. The new Housing-Enabling Water Infrastructure (HEWI) lending stream, under Infrastructure Ontario's (IO) Loan Program, will support the construction, expansion and rehabilitation of drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure projects that enable new homes. Infrastructure Ontario will begin accepting applications from municipalities on December 2, 2024.

"We continue to hear from our municipal partners that one of the greatest barriers to building more homes is the need for new and expanded drinking water, wastewater and stormwater management facilities," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "I know there are communities across the province that want to get new homes built but need to expand their water capacity first. This new flexible financing option will help more municipalities get shovels in the ground on much-needed water infrastructure projects and more homes."

The new IO HEWI lending stream complements existing provincial programs, such as the <a href="Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund">Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund</a>, and delivers on the government's commitment outlined in the <a href="2024 Ontario Budget">2024 Ontario Budget</a> to improve flexibility on loans for water infrastructure projects. The lending stream will provide municipalities, including small, rural and northern municipalities, with more flexible loan options during both the construction and repayment phases of the project. Municipalities will be able take advantage of flexible borrowing terms that allow them to defer interest payments during the construction phase until projects are substantially complete, select longer debenture repayment terms of up to 40 years, choose more flexible repayment terms and incur lower administration costs.



"The affordable, long-term financing available to municipalities through IO's lending program has supported the modernization and renewal of public infrastructure in 335 municipalities across the province," said Michael Lindsay, President and CEO, Infrastructure Ontario. "We look forward to working with our municipal partners to realize the potential of this lending stream, ultimately to enable the construction of more housing to benefit the people of Ontario."

The government is also investing nearly \$2 billion in housing-enabling infrastructure funding through the <a href="Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund">Housing Infrastructure Program</a>, in addition to the provincial <a href="Building Faster Fund">Building Faster Fund</a>, to help municipalities deliver the core infrastructure needed – such as roads, bridges, drinking water and wastewater facilities – to build more homes across the province. This investment is part of the most ambitious capital plan in Ontario's history, with more than \$191 billion over the next decade to build and improve transit, highways, hospitals, schools, long-term care facilities and other critical public infrastructure, while strengthening the economy for the future.

#### **Quick Facts**

- The <u>Infrastructure Ontario Loan Program</u> helps municipalities and other public sector partners to build and renew public infrastructure by providing short-term construction financing and long-term fixed interest-rate loans at affordable interest rates. As of October 2024, the program has supported over 3,800 local infrastructure projects valued at more than \$22 billion.
- Under the first intake of the \$1.22 billion Housing-Enabling Water Systems
   Fund, the province is investing \$970 million in 54 water infrastructure projects
   across 60 municipalities that will help enable the construction of approximately
   500,000 new homes.
- Ontario is also providing \$400 million in funding to municipalities under the Housing-Enabling Core Servicing stream of the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program to build, maintain and repair core assets such as municipal roads, bridges and culverts that will enable the construction of new homes.

## RE: Guelph City Council Resolution to Enable Municipalities to Charge Fees for use of Municipal Property by Gas Utilities

Dear Premier Ford, Minister Calandra and Minister Lecce,

Guelph City Council at its meeting held on November 26, 2024 passed a resolution regarding the ability of municipalities to charge gas utilities for their use of municipal property, which included the following motions:

- That Council request the Province of Ontario to amend section 9 of Regulation 584/06 under the Municipal Act, 2001, to permit municipalities to charge fair fees to for-profit gas utilities for their use of public property, as municipalities do in most other provinces.
- 2. That Council direct staff, to the satisfaction of the DCAO of IDE, to negotiate a Franchise Agreement with the gas distribution company that:
  - a. will allow the City of Guelph to charge fees for use of public property if and when Ontario Regulation 584/06 is amended to allow such charges,
  - will ensure that the City of Guelph is not liable to pay for any gas infrastructure relocations needed due to conflicts with municipal infrastructure, and
  - will ensure future charges for use of municipal property is not passed on to Guelph customers of the gas distribution company.

Across most of Canada, municipalities charge for-profit gas utilities fees for the use of municipal property. This revenue supports municipalities in managing abandoned gas distribution infrastructure and any conflicts with municipal infrastructure without increasing the financial burden on property taxpayers. However, in Ontario, Section 9 of O.Reg. 584/06 under the Municipal Act, 2001 prohibits municipalities from charging for-profit gas utilities these fees. If the charging of these fees is permitted, revenues would provide much needed funding towards essential City services and programs, and support the City in funding any future work associated with gas distribution infrastructure.

As Guelph seeks to renew its Franchise Agreement, which sets out the conditions for the use of municipal property by the gas distribution company, there is an opportunity to review the compensation framework for municipalities across Ontario. Many sectors and individuals are increasingly transitioning away from natural gas in favour of cleaner and carbon-free technologies, and Guelph Council believes municipalities should not be locked in to long-term agreements which limit the ability of municipalities to receive fair compensation from for-profit gas distribution companies.

As such, Guelph City Council requests the Province of Ontario amend section 9 of O.Reg. 584/06 under the Municipal Act, 2001, to permit municipalities to charge fees to for-profit gas utilities for their use of public property. Additionally, Guelph City Council would like to express its support, in principle, for Bill 219 – the No Free Ride for Fossil Fuels Act, 2024, which would enshrine the right of municipalities to charge fees under the Municipal Act, 2001, and the City of Toronto Act, 2006.

### Ontario Introduces Legislation to Strengthen Emergency Management

Government proposing to modernize legislation for the first time in more than 15 years

December 09, 2024

Treasury Board Secretariat

TORONTO — Today, the Ontario government is taking steps to better prepare Ontario for floods, wildland fires and other emergencies with the introduction of the *Emergency Management Modernization Act*. The proposed legislation aims to update and strengthen the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (EMCPA), ensuring a more effective, coordinated and comprehensive approach to provincial and municipal emergency prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery efforts.

"The rise of extreme weather events and cyber-attacks means the nature of modern emergencies has changed," said Trevor Jones, Associate Minister of Emergency Preparedness and Response. "By modernizing our emergency management legislation, we will ensure Ontario remains ready to respond to these new challenges and keep people and communities safe."

If passed, the new EMCPA amendments — the first comprehensive updates in more than 15 years — would modernize Ontario's emergency management framework by strengthening provincial leadership and coordination. Emergency Management Ontario would enhance its role as the central hub, or "one window," for coordinating provincial emergency management efforts, streamlining communication and resources. The proposed legislation also prioritizes community-led approaches, helping municipalities design emergency management programs that reflect their unique needs and capacities.

Additionally, the process for municipalities to declare local emergencies would be clarified, including procedures for emergency declarations and requests for assistance.



The legislation builds on the government's Provincial Emergency Management Strategy and Action Plan (PEMSAP). Introduced in 2023, the PEMSAP highlights key actions the province is taking to ensure communities across Ontario are safe, practiced and prepared before, during and after emergencies.

#### **Quick Facts**

 This proposed legislative modernization is informed by valuable feedback from partners, best practices in emergency management, and lessons learned from past emergencies. Over the summer, Emergency Management Ontario engaged with more than 480 partners, including municipalities, First Nations communities, and emergency management organizations during 45 engagements. Ninety written submissions were also received on a publicly posted discussion guide.

### Ontario Restoring Safety to Parks and Public Spaces

Province taking action to end encampments and crack down on public use of illegal drugs while investing \$75.5 million in homelessness prevention

December 12, 2024

Office of the Premier

TORONTO — The Ontario government will introduce legislation today that will, if passed, better protect community safety by providing municipalities and police with new resources and enforcement tools to address the growing problem of homeless encampments and crack down on illegal drug use in parks and public spaces. Ontario is also investing \$75.5 million to further support homelessness prevention and provide people living in encampments with access to reasonable alternative accommodation. This is in addition to the province's ongoing \$700 million investment in homelessness prevention programs each year, as well as the \$378 million the province is investing in 19 Homelessness and Addiction Recovery Treatment (HART) Hubs.

"Mayors and residents from communities across Ontario have been clear that enough is enough when it comes to encampments and illegal drug use in our parks and public spaces," said Premier Doug Ford. "Families deserve to enjoy their local parks and playgrounds without fearing for their kids. People facing homelessness or addiction and mental health challenges should be supported in the right settings. The federal government's approach of legalizing dangerous drugs for use in our communities has failed and it needs to end."

The province is dedicating \$75.5 million for programs that provide more long-term stable housing and temporary accommodations for those living in encampments, including:

 \$5.5 million to top up the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit (COHB) to immediately free-up emergency shelter spaces for people living in encampments by helping people living in shelters move into longer-term housing, building on the nearly \$400 million Ontario and the federal government invested in COHB between 2023 and 2024.



- \$20 million to expand shelter capacity and create additional temporary accommodation spaces, like tiny modular units and climate-controlled semi-permanent structures, to provide people living in encampments with accessible alternative living options.
- \$50 million in funding designated for ready-to-build affordable housing projects across the province. This funding will be allocated based on how close a project is to completion, as well as its value for money, to help projects near completion but in need of targeted additional funding to open their doors faster.

This investment includes \$44.5 million in new provincial funding and \$31 million from the Canada-Ontario Community Housing Initiative.

Service managers who receive funding will be required to report back to the province on the number of individuals moved from encampments into new accommodations. They will also be required to submit spending plans to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing for review and approval, to ensure the province's \$654 million yearly investment in the Homelessness Prevention Program is being used effectively and in line with the shared provincial and municipal goal of ending encampments by providing safe and stable housing for people at risk of homelessness.

To help clear parks and public spaces of encampments, the *Safer Municipalities Act*, 2024 includes amendments to the *Trespass to Property Act*, which applies to private business, offices, stores, hotels, parks and vacant land. These amendments, if passed, will enhance penalties for people who deliberately and continually break the law by adding the new aggravating factors of continuous trespassing and the likelihood to reoffend. In cases where these factors are present, these new tools will be applied by the court during sentencing.

The government is further protecting communities by introducing the *Restricting Public Consumption of Illegal Substances Act*, 2024 that will, if passed, allow police officers and other provincial offences officers to direct individuals to stop using illegal substances or to leave the public space. This will allow them to issue a ticket or arrest someone who does not comply, providing an important additional tool to stop the consumption of illegal drugs in public spaces. People found guilty of violating this legislation, including those doing so in encampments, could face fines of up to \$10,000 or up to six months in prison.

As part of the province's focus on long-term treatment and recovery, the government is exploring new judicial approaches that provide the option of rehabilitation as an alternative to incarceration in the event of minor or non-violent drug crimes.

## NOTICE OF DECISION With Respect to an Official Plan Subsection 17(35) and 21 of the Planning Act

A decision was made by County of Simcoe Council on November 26, 2024 to approve an Official Plan for the Township of Clearview, as adopted by Township of Clearview By-law No. 2024-38, and modified as per Schedule 3 to Item CCW 2024-253, save and except for the following non-decision noted below:

#### Non-Decisions

That the County's approval does not apply to the following Non-Decision:

 A Non-Decision applies to various sections of the OP that reference the 2051 planning horizon for growth and development of the plan.

The specific partial policies include the '2041' and '2051' column data in the following tables within policy section 1.2.3:

Table 1.1: Target distribution of population growth to 2051;

Table 1.2: Projected employment Growth in Clearview;

Table 1.3: Target distribution of new dwelling units;

Table 1.4: Target share of housing density types per Settlement Area.

#### Purpose and Effect of the Official Plan

It is a legislative requirement under Section 26 (1) of the *Planning Act*, for the council of a municipality to revise their official plan as required every 10 years to ensure that it: conforms with provincial plans or does not conflict with them, has regard to the matters of provincial interest, and is consistent with policy statements issued under Section 3 (1) of the *Planning Act*. This constitutes the provincial plan conformity exercise identified in Section 26 (2.1) of the *Planning Act*. As such, the County of Simcoe is the approval authority for local municipal official plans as per Section 17 of the *Planning Act*.

This decision is consistent with policy statements issued under the *Planning Act* and conforms and is consistent with Provincial and County plans. **Public Input** in the form of oral and written submissions were received from the public and agencies and were incorporated into the adopted version of the Official Plan as appropriate. The effect of any further comments and associated modifications to the Official Plan since adoption are included in Schedule 3 to Item CCW 2024-253. The County is satisfied that these comments were considered and/or addressed to the greatest extent possible prior to approval of the Township's new Official Plan.

#### When and How to File an Appeal

Any appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal must be filed with the Clerk of the County of Simcoe no later than 20 days from the date of this notice, shown above as the last date of appeal.

An appeal may only be made on the basis that the part of the decision to which the notice of appeal relates is inconsistent with a policy statement, fails to conform with or conflicts with a

provincial plan or, in the case of the official plan of a lower-tier municipality, fails to conform with the upper-tier municipality's official plan.

The notice of appeal should be sent to the attention of Jonathan Magill, County Clerk, at the address shown below and it must:

- (1) set out the specific part of the proposed official plan or official plan amendment to which the appeal applies;
- (2) set out the reasons for the request for the appeal;
- (3) include a completed Tribunal Appellant Form (A1); and,
- (4) be accompanied by the fee charged under the Ontario Land Tribunal Act, 2021 in the amount of \$1,100.00, payable by certified cheque to the Minister of Finance, Province of Ontario.

#### Who Can File an Appeal

Only the applicant, specified person and public bodies as defined in the *Planning Act*, and registered owners of lands to which the by-law will apply and who made submissions at the public meeting or who have made written submission to the municipality before the by-law was passed, will be able to appeal the decision of the County of Simcoe to the Ontario Land Tribunal.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the plan was adopted, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

#### When the Decision is Final

The decision of the County of Simcoe is final if a Notice of Appeal is not received on or before the last day for filing a notice of appeal (please refer to the Last Date of Appeal noted above).

## Council approves 2025 County of Simcoe Budget

Council approved a \$962 million budget for 2025, which focuses on the resources necessary to maintain existing services and address significant growth in communities across the region. The 2025 budget also includes strategic allocations that enable the County to continue to invest in services and assets such as infrastructure, long-term care, paramedic services, museum, transit, affordable housing, the Lake Simcoe Regional Airport, waste collections, economic development, tourism, and enhancements to our road network.

At the direction and approval of County Council, residents will see a 3.625% increase (1.625% per cent increase for operating and a 2 per cent increase for infrastructure and asset management) on the County portion of their municipal property taxes in 2025.

The County's 2025 budget incudes key projects to continue building up Simcoe County, including:

- New LINX Transit route to serve south Simcoe communities
- Continued progress at the Simcoe Village Campus redevelopment
- A large affordable housing build in Barrie and completion of other sites
- Phased road work on CR4, 21 and 22
- A new Paramedic Station in Waubaushene
- Museum expansion for the C. Matthews Innovation and Transportation Gallery
- Redevelopment of the Bradford West Gwillimbury waste drop-off facility

# Council approves YMCA of Simcoe Muskoka funding

The YMCA of Simcoe Muskoka is requesting \$5 million total from the County of Simcoe for a new multi-use facility in Barrie – this includes the original \$2.5 million that was approved by Council in 2019, plus an additional \$2.5 million due to inflationary considerations and increased construction costs since then.

Council approved the request based on staff's report after it was deferred to the November 12, 2024 Committee of the Whole Meeting.

Staff's recommendation was to approve the full \$5 million requested from the YMCA of Simcoe Muskoka contingent on the development of a multi-use facility to service the City of Barrie that includes transitional housing for youth and enabling the leadership of a multicultural centre in partnership

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with the Simcoe County Local Immigration Partnership. The \$5 million would be paid in installments that coincide with continued construction progress: \$500,000 in 2024, \$1.5 million in 2025 and \$3 million in 2027 upon completion of construction.

The project has already received \$29.9 million in construction funding from the provincial government, and a 50-year land lease from the City of Barrie.

## Council Approves Joining the Municipal Insurance Pool and Supporting Startup

Council authorized signing the Form of Subscription in the Municipalities in the County of Simcoe Subscribers' Agreement to join the Municipal Insurance Pool. In addition, Council approved financial support for the startup of the municipal insurance pool.

The report outlined the proposed insurance pool structure, financial projections, governance and administration to startup the Municipal Insurance Pool.

Each participating municipality is requested to complete and submit the Form of Subscription within the subscribers' agreement by March 1, 2025, to allow time to set up the advisory board and then become one of the Founding Subscribers effective June 1, 2025.

The Municipal Insurance Pool will allow subscribers to gain greater control of and reduce an existing substantial expense by 13 to 20% immediately, and then by 19 to 27% after set-up. Representing 1 to 2 million dollars in savings over the next 10 years for each municipality.

Opportunities such as this are extremely rare. Staff are hopeful that all municipalities will recognize this and join as Founding Subscribers. Waiting is not likely a viable option since any potential new member will need to buy into the established reserve and be approved by the existing members.

# **Paramedic Services Facility Plan**

The update on the Paramedic Services Facility Plan highlights significant progress, including the optimization of the Barrie Simcoe Emergency Services Campus (BSESC), completion of the Bradford Station, ongoing construction of the Springwater South (Midhurst) post, and planning for new stations in Waubaushene, Severn, Wasaga Beach, and additional posts in Barrie.

Evaluations are ongoing for optimal locations for future facilities, including the Innisfil facility and the Perkinsfield post, which may be relocated to enhance response times. Staff are also reviewing options for posts in Tottenham, Everett, and Horseshoe Valley Resort, and planning additional posts in Barrie. Strategic land acquisition is being monitored to reduce long-



term costs, with funding requirements included in the Long-Term Financial Plan.

## Re: Municipal Insurance Pool Startup

Following a meeting of CAOs and Treasurers held on Friday, October 25, 2024, at which the County's consultant Axxima covered the benefits of the Municipal Insurance Pool, report CCW 2024-307 Municipal Insurance Pool Startup was brought forward to County Council. The attached report, provided for your information, sets out the proposed insurance pool structure, financial projections, governance and administration. At the November 26, 2024 County Council meeting, the following resolution was adopted:

"That Item CCW 2024-307, dated November 26, 2024, regarding the Municipal Insurance Pool Startup, be received; and

That the Warden and Clerk be authorized to sign the Form of Subscription in the Municipalities in the County of Simcoe Subscribers' Agreement substantially in the form attached; and

That the General Manager of Corporate Performance, or the Treasurer, or appropriate designate assigned by the General Manager, Corporate Performance, be authorized to represent the County of Simcoe on the Municipal Insurance Pool Advisory Board; and

That financial support for the startup of the municipal insurance pool, as outlined in this Item, be approved; and

That the County Clerk circulate this report to all member municipalities and the City of Orillia for information."

The Municipal Insurance Pool will reduce a substantial expense for subscribers in the anticipated amount of 13 to 20% immediately and 19 to 27% after it is set up. Over the next ten years this represents a major savings of 1 to 2 million dollars for each municipality that subscribes. As opportunities for these savings are rare, your municipality is strongly encouraged to join the Municipal Insurance Pool now as a founding member. Joining the Insurance Pool at a later date may not be feasible as members will need to buy into the established reserve which must first be approved by existing members.

Attached as Schedule 1 to report CCW 2024-307, included with this letter, is the Subscribers' Agreement for the Insurance Pool program. The agreement establishes an Advisory Board responsible for directing decisions regarding the Insurance Pool. The Advisory Board will be composed of one Member appointed by each subscriber municipality and each Member will have one vote. In addition, a Council may authorize a staff member to represent the



municipality on the Insurance Pool Advisory Board. The agreement further sets out the conditions of the Insurance Pool, operations of the Advisory Board, the funding arrangement for the purchase of insurance, accounting and financial reporting, subscriber terms, operation of the fund and other general provisions.

To join the Insurance Pool, the Council of each municipality will need to approve and authorize signing of the Subscribers' Agreement, as exemplified in the County's above resolution. Participating municipalities will need to complete and submit the Form of Subscription within the Subscribers' Agreement by March 1, 2025. Please forward a copy to <a href="Clerks@Simcoe.ca">Clerks@Simcoe.ca</a>. This will allow time to set up the Advisory Board for Founding subscribers in advance of a June 1, 2025 launch. A five-year minimum commitment is required to join the Insurance Pool.

Our consultant Axxima and County staff are available to assist municipal staff as needed to present Insurance Pool information to respective Councils to achieve agreement. We look forward to working collaboratively with each of you to bring forward this extremely valuable and rare opportunity to generate significant efficiencies and savings for our respective municipalities.

# County implements another rapid re-housing support in the City of Barrie

Midhurst/December 4, 2024 – The County of Simcoe is implementing another Supportive Rapid Re-Housing Program (SRRP) within the City of Barrie. Based on the pilot program that the County successfully implemented in the city, this renewed SRRP program is anticipated to help address housing needs for at-risk seniors (55+) chronically using emergency shelters and in need of supportive housing in the City of Barrie. This new program is another additional service being added to broad system of services at no additional cost and is a major step towards ending chronic homelessness for seniors living in shelters in the County of Simcoe.

The Supportive Rapid Re-Housing Program (SRRP) provides services, housing and support to individuals who have fallen on difficult times and helps to place them into permanent housing quickly. These individuals are ones who have been identified as situationally homeless (i.e., due to a recent life event, rather than chronically homeless). This SRRP provides seniors (55+) with wrap around housing with integrated supports to find and integrate into permanent housing successfully. This is NOT a shelter, it's a temporary home for individuals as they prepare for more independent living situations.

The site's initial modular, pre-built housing structure will be moved from its current location on Rose Street to the County's new property acquisition at Blake Street and Penetanguishene Road in Barrie in the coming weeks. Once placed, the County will enter into a contract with a qualified agency to provide comprehensive, 24/7 on-site services, staffed with trained professionals. Future use of the site will be communicated following further review with service partners to ensure the services provided continue to support the County's system of services and meet the goals set out by its <a href="https://doi.org/10.2007/journal.org/10.2007/

The program is expected to resume operations in winter 2024/25 (subject to change) and provide support for approximately 14 people at a time (excluding staff and support teams). This is a temporary structure, and it is anticipated that the program will run for approximately four months.

This is part of the County of Simcoe's efforts to expand the support for and availability of supportive housing while alleviating pressure on the local shelter system. This strategy will now result in a total of 48 current shelter beds, all being made available throughout the winter months. This is thanks to various strategies including <u>SRRPs</u> and new <u>permanent accommodations for seniors in a domiciliary care environment</u> which enable shelter beds to be freed up with the creation of additional spaces. By creating net new permanent and rapid re-housing programs for those at-risk seniors who have been living in the emergency shelter system and moving these individuals from the shelter system to other forms of supportive and assisted housing, the County is able to enhance its winter response strategy while creating permanent housing outcomes for vulnerable individuals.

The County's <u>10-Point Homelessness Prevention Strategy</u> creates capacity in the system to better transition individuals who have been identified as situationally homeless into permanent housing while alleviating pressures on regional shelter systems.

Previously, a similar program in the City of Barrie resulted in many successful outcomes, with no known negative impact on the surrounding neighbourhood. Based on its success, the County opened a youth-based SRRP program in Orillia and a seniors-based SRRP program in Collingwood. All three programs have utilized similar modular, pre-built structures.



## About the Supportive Rapid Re-Housing Program (SRRP)

The County's Supportive Rapid Re-Housing Program (SRRP) is a temporary program designed to assist individuals who are facing homelessness transition into permanent housing within a short period of time (typically 180 days). Clients are considered low-risk individuals who have been impacted by situational homelessness.

People who live in the SRRP units are supported through all aspects of the move-in process, including:

- unit viewings
- reviewing leases
- · furnishing apartments
- establishing connections

On-going follow-up supports are provided to ensure clients are adapting well and support they require is available. During the SRRP housing period, residents will be provided full wrap-around services including mental health, addiction, employment supports and other needs.

# County creates resource sheet supporting unhoused individuals across region

Midhurst/December 10, 2024 – The County of Simcoe has created a new resource sheet supporting unhoused individuals across the region. This sheet includes details on various programs that are available throughout winter 2024-2025 and will be regularly updated on the County's website as supports continue to open for the region's most vulnerable individuals.

The resource sheet outlines investments in unhoused individuals across the region made through the County's 10-point homelessness prevention strategy, which provides significant investments and resources to help unhoused individuals across the region. It includes recent announcements, such as expansions to the County's Supportive Rapid Re-Housing Program (SRRP), expanded domiciliary care agreements housing more vulnerable seniors, warming centres, and more.

The 10-point homelessness prevention strategy makes affordable housing even more attainable by increasing supply, creating "deep rent subsidies", increasing eviction prevention services, and improving available shelter. It commits the County to find new opportunities, enhance community shelter services, and improve safety throughout the community.

Those in need of shelter or warmth can always call 2-1-1 to connect with a nearby shelter. The County's Winter Warming Supports 2024-25 Resource Sheet is attached.

# Winter warming strategy

- While it is not within its legislated provincial and federal mandate, the County of Simcoe facilitates a winter warming strategy on behalf of member municipalities and the two separated cities that opt to offer differing levels of resources.
- The County issued a Request for Proposal in June 2024 for a multi-year funding opportunity for warming and cooling services. Since then, the County has been in negotiations with a number of different service providers to secure more warming options for those staying outside.
- Currently, the winter warming services strategy offers regional options during inclement weather from October 15, 2024, to April 30, 2025.

## Alternate Space Activation

- Alternative Space Activation is a newer option introduced last winter that created approximately 110 spaces in our emergency shelter locations when the weather drops below -10 degrees Celsius.
- This is not a bedded program but an overnight drop-in option for those staying outside. It provides space throughout each location that could include cafeterias, boardrooms, offices, and lounges.
- Clients who choose to use this activated space would not need to go through the regular intake process, but the service provided would capture capacity counts to adhere to the fire code and give the County a better understanding of the overall service need.
- The service providers would offer something warm to drink and time to rest. These spaces could be operated during the day or night. Last year, the program was activated approximately 20 times.
- When activated, Alternate Space Activation is available 24/7.

# Motel Voucher Program

- Recently, the County centralized the Motel Voucher Program through Community Connections' 211 services.
- This program allows spaces to dynamically expand as needed. It gives access to
  adults and families with children, along with those who cannot access the shelter
  system for varying reasons, an opportunity for alternative accessible space.
- This service also assists with transportation to participating motel locations throughout the County, as currently, homelessness outreach services do not provide client transportation. Clients utilizing this option are required to complete full intake.

## Winter Warming Centres

- All six of the County Social & Community Services offices are available to anyone
  who needs to come inside and stay warm between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.,
  Monday to Friday. Locations can be found at simcoe.ca/HomelessnessSystem
  - All offices have on-site Ontario Works staff, along with various community agencies such as ODSP, Employment Ontario, CMHA, etc.
    - Please note, times and availability of community partners will vary by date and location.
  - Additional services (varies by location) include access to winter clothing (i.e. hats, gloves, Jackets, etc), light snacks, and access to computers and phones.
  - The Orillia SCS office is home to a primary health care clinic, available every Tuesday and Wednesday, for individuals without a primary health care provider.
    - The Clinic's Nurse Practitioners are able to: diagnose illnesses and injuries, perform routine checkups, order procedures/diagnostic tests, assist in completing social assistance-related medical-related forms, refer to other health professionals, and prescribe medications.
- As the System Service Manager, the County of Simcoe funds five libraries, three
  food banks, two housing resource centres and a larger breakfast program in the
  City of Barrie, that all provide different daytime indoor services for those
  experiencing homeless.
  - All of these year-round programs remain available for those who choose to utilize them.
- Warming centre locations can be found at simcoe.ca/HomelessnessSystem
- Overnight warming spaces: The County has overnight night warming programs in Orillia, Bradford and Barrie – this includes two new programs in the City of Barrie.
  - These four programs offer a total of 58 overnight warming spaces.
  - Ten of the spaces in Barrie are activated during inclement weather, while the other ten are offered specifically for those with additional needs and accommodations throughout the winter.
- Future spaces in Barrie: The County has also secured two new locations in the City of Barrie that will offer an additional 30 spaces for daytime and overnight services.
  - These two new programs are anticipated to be ready in the next few weeks and will be available until April 30, 2025.
- Future spaces in additional communities: The County is also planning for new, additional warming programs in several additional communities across the region.

## Supporting vulnerable seniors

- Since November 2024, the County of Simcoe has begun permanently transitioning 48 seniors (55+) living in emergency shelters to assisted living programs and modular rapid rehousing programs.
- The three new programs located in Barrie open up an additional 48 emergency shelter beds that would have previously been used by these individuals.

#### Outreach Services

- The County funds nine outreach services that will continue to offer support to those who may choose to remain outside.
- Enhanced street outreach services provide outreach to those experiencing homelessness 365 days a year, seven days a week, with increased emphasis during extreme winter temperatures.
- Outreach teams facilitate access to shelter or respite beds and offer
  individualized supports to help with accessing a range of services such as
  income supports, mental health and addiction services, health care services and
  assisting individuals to develop plans to transition from to more permanent
  housing options.

Dear Head of Council:

Through the *More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022*, changes were made to the *Planning Act* to accelerate implementation of the province's additional residential unit (ARU) framework. These changes allowed "as-of-right" (without the need to apply for a rezoning) the use of up to 3 units per lot in many existing residential areas (i.e., up to 3 units allowed in the primary building, or up to 2 units allowed in the primary building and 1 unit allowed in an ancillary building such as a garage).

To support implementation of ARUs, the *Cutting Red Tape to Build More Homes Act*, 2024, made further changes to the *Planning Act* to provide me, as the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, with broader regulation-making authority to remove municipal zoning by-law barriers that may be limiting the development of ARUs.

Following consultation on the Environmental Registry of Ontario, our government has taken further action to tackle the housing supply crisis and reach our goal of building more homes by amending Ontario Regulation 299/19 – Additional Residential Units to remove certain municipal zoning by-law barriers. These changes took effect upon filing.

These changes will help to facilitate the creation of ARUs, such as basement suites and garden suites, by eliminating barriers including maximum lot coverage, angular planes, floor space index (FSI), minimum separation distances and minimum lot sizes on parcels of urban residential land subject to the ARU framework in the *Planning Act*. It is my expectation that municipalities will respect these regulatory changes and the intent behind them. I will not hesitate to use my available powers to ensure these changes to the Planning Act are allowed to support our goal of building more homes. Alla

We will continue working with our municipal partners to achieve our goal of building the homes that Ontarians need.

# Ontario Appoints Third-Party Advisor to Lead Review of OMERS

Robert Poirier to undertake pension plan governance review

December 03, 2024

TORONTO — Ontario has appointed a third-party advisor to undertake a governance review of the Ontario Municipal Employees' Retirement System (OMERS), the first review since 2012, to ensure that its governance model is serving the interests of plan members in a fair, equitable, and transparent manner that supports the plan's long-term financial sustainability.

Former Metrolinx board member and former chair of the Toronto Port Authority Robert Poirier will oversee the review. As third-party advisor, he will offer recommendations to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to help deliver the best pension plan possible for plan members.

"We are committed to strengthening OMERS governance to ensure that it works in the best interests of its members," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "This review will ensure important decisions that impact members continue to be made in a transparent way."

The review will look at various aspects of the OMERS Sponsors Corporation and the OMERS Administration Corporation, such as board representation and the effective delivery of their mandates. This includes how plan assets are managed and how investment decisions are made by the Administration Corporation. It will also look at best practices in pension governance that could potentially be implemented by OMERS.

The review will not focus on any financial details or decisions regarding contribution rates, fairness of plan benefits, or the supplemental plan.

A igwedge retired employees of municipalities, local agencies, public utilities, firefighters, police, paramedic, and non-teaching school board staff across the province.

- In 2006, the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System Act, 2006 came into effect, transferring sponsor responsibilities such as making changes to the OMERS pension plan from the Province of Ontario to the OMERS Sponsors Corporation.
- In 2012, the government appointed a third-party advisor to conduct a governance review in line with requirements set out in the OMERS Review Act, 2006. The advisor identified areas where OMERS governance should be improved at that time.

AMO and municipalities across Ontario have loudly advocated for provincial action to address the unmanageable increase in Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) costs for next year. AMO is proud to have worked closely with the government to address these concerns raised by municipalities. Today, the <a href="mailto:provincial government proposed">provincial government proposed</a> more than \$77 million in 2025 to provide municipal budget relief and invest in Ontario's communities.

The majority of Ontario's municipalities proudly partner with the Ontario Provincial Police to keep their communities safe. Ontarians already pay the highest policing costs in the country, and these additional costs were beyond municipal fiscal capacity to absorb. While AMO appreciates the provincial action to address this specific issue, a broader solution to the weakening foundations of municipal fiscal sustainability is critically needed. AMO continues to call on the province for a comprehensive review of the municipal-provincial fiscal framework that helps provide the services that Ontarians rely on every day, including policing.

AMO looks forward to continuing to work closely with the provincial government as they look forward to reviewing the OPP billing model to ensure it continues to meet the needs of communities across the province.

# **AMO Pre-Budget Submission 2025**

On behalf of its members, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) is continuing to advance its advocacy on the urgent, province-wide need for a comprehensive review of provincial-municipal fiscal arrangements.

The provincial-municipal fiscal framework is broken. As municipal councils work through their budget processes, it's clear that municipalities across the province are facing immense pressure created by growing costs in areas of provincial jurisdiction.

For almost a year, municipalities across the province have been calling on the provincial government to sit down with municipalities and collaboratively engage on a Social and Economic Prosperity Review. More than 170 municipalities across Ontario joined the call and passed a <u>resolution</u> asking the provincial government to respond to these concerns.

Unfortunately, the provincial government has not agreed to come to the table. But a lack of provincial engagement hasn't changed the critical need for a new fiscal framework.

AMO will be evolving its advocacy through its upcoming 2025 pre-budget submission, which will be released in mid-January. In this submission, AMO will be calling for provincial action on three key areas that would support municipal fiscal sustainability in order to improve the quality of life in communities across Ontario, including:

1. Long-term and predictable investments in municipal infrastructure: Ontario municipalities are planning to invest more than \$250B in capital expenditures over the next ten years to meet growth needs, improve transportation and adapt to climate changes, but the current funding approaches are insufficient.

The provincial and federal governments are under-investing in



infrastructure, funding programs are often piecemeal and short-term, and infrastructure funding programs do not grow with the economy.

2. Reducing the province's reliance on municipal property taxes to fund health and social services programs. In 2022, municipal expenditures subsidized health services, housing and social and family services by \$4B. That is \$4B taken away from core municipal priorities and it only continued to grow in 2023.

Responsibility for funding community housing should be uploaded to the province and provincial funding for health services, like public health and long-term care, should be sufficient to meet legislative requirements and standards for quality of care so municipalities don't have to step in to fill the gaps.

3. Addressing the systemic causes of homelessness through investment in income security, and mental health and addictions treatment services, taking the pressure off police and paramedics and improving public safety.

In early January, AMO along with key partners, will be releasing the results of an ambitious research project on the scope and scale of homelessness across Ontario, and the provincial investments needed to truly address it. AMO will be sharing more information on the key outcomes of this work as well as communications tools with members before it is released in early January.

While each municipality faces unique local circumstances, so many of the fundamental challenges caused by unsustainable fiscal arrangements are the same. AMO will be following-up with additional resources to support unified messaging across membership, including:

- Key messages regarding municipal fiscal sustainability to support delegations at the ROMA Conference in January.
- A communications toolkit (e.g., social media, key messages, template press releases) early in the new year that will provide members with more support in bringing a united message to the provincial government on the need for municipal fiscal sustainability to enhance quality of life for all Ontarians.

We know that municipalities across Ontario are under pressure to respond to increasing budget pressures, but the municipal sector is strongest when it speaks with one strong and united voice.

# AMO 2025 Pre-Budget Submission Preview

AMO understands that the provincial-municipal fiscal framework is broken. Municipalities across Ontario are facing immense pressure this budget season, largely created by growing costs in areas of provincial jurisdiction. For almost a year, AMO has been calling for a Social and Economic Prosperity Review. Unfortunately, the provincial government has not come to the table. However, we know the problem remains and we are evolving our strategy.

AMO sent a <u>letter</u> to all elected AMO members, CAOs, and Treasurers highlighting the key elements of our upcoming 2025 pre-budget submission. That submission will be released in mid-January and will call for provincial action in three key areas that would support municipal fiscal sustainability and improve quality of life for Ontarians:

- Long-term and predictable provincial investments in municipal infrastructure
- Reducing the province's reliance on municipal property taxes to fund health and social services
- Addressing the root causes of homelessness, building off an ambitious research project on homelessness that AMO and key partners will release in January

We know our sector is strongest when speaking with one unified voice. AMO will be following up in the coming weeks with a variety of communications



tools to support member's participation in ROMA delegations, and advance municipal fiscal sustainability and homelessness priorities.

# \$1 Billion Loan Program for Water Systems

The province recently <u>announced</u> a new Infrastructure Ontario financing program for water infrastructure projects that enable the construction of more homes.

This program will complement the existing provincial infrastructure funding programs that AMO has advocated for to achieve the province's ambitious goal of 1.5 million new homes by 2031. This new financial tool for municipalities offers the following features:

- Flexible borrowing terms with deferred interest payments during construction
- Longer debenture repayment terms of up to 40 years
- More flexible repayment terms, and
- Lower administration costs

Applications will be open in early December and more details are available in a short newsletter.

# **Omnibus Red Tape Reduction Bill**

Bill 227, Cutting Red Tape, Building Ontario Act, 2024 was <u>introduced</u> on November 20 and includes a broad range of proposals from most ministries. Those impacting municipalities the most include:

- A new allowance for minor errors on forms and changes to prevent delays in decision-making could help reduce the Landlord and Tenant Board backlog
- Providing credit agencies access to Landlord and Tenant Board orders related to missed payments, which could help landlords make more informed decisions about prospective tenants
- Recent regulatory changes in support of Ontario One Call streamlined the dedicated locator model for broadband projects, potentially

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speeding up implementation and reducing costs. In response to feedback from our sector, some municipal underground infrastructure owners can now conduct their own locates instead of the broadband project owner. The province is seeking input on implementing these changes

 Proposals to streamline the release of Ontario Heritage Trust lands without heritage value and the approval process for brownfield development could help unlock more land for development. AMO has long advocated for the province to review its own processes and approvals to enable development and welcomes these efficiencies

Many other proposals are housekeeping amendments or have no direct impact on the municipal sector.

The bill was fast-tracked, bypassing public hearings. AMO will be commenting on some elements of the bill posted to the Environmental Registry.

## **Environmental Bill**

Bill 228, Resource Management and Safety Act, 2024, was <u>introduced</u> on November 25 including a range of environmental proposals along with a proposal to help attract more surveyors to the profession in support of building safe and affordable housing options.

AMO will comment on elements of the Bill posted in various Environmental Registry proposals, focusing on:

- Changes that could impact municipalities' activities in wildland fire management and require new resources. AMO will advocate for the province to absorb any new costs
- Commending the province for taking action on climate change with its proposal for commercial carbon storage projects. AMO will support the proposed municipal role in decision-making for these projects
- Support for protecting communities from the hazards of deteriorating oil and gas wells



AMO supported the government's proposal to streamline the process for qualified Manitoba building officials to work in Northern Ontario in its Environmental Registry comments. AMO also continued to advocate for measures that will attract and retain building officials to address the shortage across the province.

#### Dear Mayor MacDonald:

Our government is proud to have a strong working relationship with both our municipal partners and the police services that keep our communities safe. The collective agreement that was reached between the province and the Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA) earlier this year reflects this strong relationship and will support our brave women and men in uniform across Ontario.

At the same time, we understand the impact these changes are having on the budgets of municipalities that are served by the OPP, including your own, which is why we are stepping up with additional provincial support. With that in mind, I am pleased to share with you the following proposed billing changes:

- A 3.75 per cent reduction of the total 2023 reconciled costs to all communities to approximate the full (100 per cent) impact of the Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA) salary increases, excluding the 1 per cent increase that was built into the 2023 estimates; and
- A 44 per cent reduction on overtime 2023 reconciled costs to all communities;
- A 10 per cent reduction of 2025 invoice amounts to all communities to approximate the full (100 per cent) impact of the OPPA salary increases excluding the 1 per cent increase that was already built into the 2023 estimate.

These changes would provide over \$77 million in relief to OPP-policed municipalities.

The total billing statement that was initially provided to you for 2025, inclusive of the increases resulting from the new collective agreement, was \$3,622,314. Today's proposed billing changes will provide an estimated \$535,184 in financial relief for your municipality, bringing the new total for OPP services being billed to your municipality in 2025 to \$3,087,130.

In addition to these changes, the Government of Ontario is continuing its annual \$125 million Court Security & Prisoner Transportation Transfer Payment Program for the 2025 calendar year.

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The province will also be examining options for reviewing the OPP billing model to ensure that it meets the needs of communities across the province.

# Ontario Offsetting OPP Cost Increases for Small and Rural Municipalities

Provincial investment would support police and community safety

November 29, 2024

TORONTO — The Ontario government is proposing to provide over \$77 million in financial relief to municipalities to help offset the increased cost of municipal police services provided by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). This investment will help these predominantly small and rural communities address the budget impacts resulting from the collective bargaining agreement that was reached between the province and the Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA) in July 2024.

"Our government is working closely with our municipal partners and our women and men in uniform to keep communities across Ontario safe," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "The financial relief we are proposing will help municipal leaders balance their budgets and invest in their communities while ensuring no change to the policing provided by the OPP that keeps families and businesses safe."

The Ontario government's proposal would support small and rural municipalities by offsetting the 2025 impacts of OPP salary increases. This includes:

- · A 3.75 per cent bill reduction on 2023 total reconciled costs,
- · A 44 per cent bill reduction on 2023 reconciled overtime costs, and
- A 10 per cent bill reduction on amounts invoiced for 2025 policing costs.

In addition to these changes, the Government of Ontario is continuing its annual \$125 million Court Security & Prisoner Transportation Transfer Payment Program for the 2025 calendar year.

The province will also be examining options for reviewing the OPP billing model to ensure that it meets the needs of communities across the province.



- The OPP provides municipal policing services to 330 municipalities across Ontario.
- The OPPA and the provincial government ratified a new uniform and civilian collective agreement in July 2024 that included general salary increases for 2023, 2024, 2025 and 2026.
